MINUTES FOR APRIL 19, 2010

OFFICE OF THE COUNTY CLERK

The Cherokee County Commissioners met April 19, 2010. The meeting was called to order by Commissioner Hilderbrand and those present were Commissioners Collins and Garner. The Pledge of Allegiance was said by all. County Clerk Crystal Gatewood submitted the minutes for April 12, 2010, Commissioner Garner made a motion to accept the minutes, his motion was seconded by Commissioner Collins, and all voted in favor.

OTHER BUSINESS

Jan Bolin of Class LTD. came before the commission to give an update on the services provided by Class LTD. She expressed budget concerns regarding state and county funding and asked the county to remember them during the budget process for 2011.

George Dockery and Steve Rocker of KDOT gave a presentation of the Highway 400 Corridor Project to the commission. The Highway 400 Project is still in the 'study and discuss' phase, no definite plans have been set. Commissioners Garner and Collins said Highway 7 should be focused upon first.

COMMISSIONERS COLLINS, GARNER, AND HILDERBRAND SIGNED OFF ON AND APPROVED THE FOLLOWING:

VOUCHER #5106 - \$1,138.00 - PRO CT - COMPUTER EQUIPMENT - CHEROKEE COUNTY HEALTH DEPT (TAKE OUT OF LINE ITEM - WIC FUNDS)

MOTIONS

Commissioner Collins made a motion to pay \$6,816.00 out of the Emergency Management Fund and \$6,816.00 out of the Landfill Fund to pay the balance owed on the county's portion of the Storm Siren Grant for Treece and Mineral Townships, his motion died for a lack of a second.

Commissioner Hilderbrand made a motion to pay \$3,614.00 out of the Emergency Management fund to pay the county's share of the Storm Siren Grant for Treece, his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner and all voted in favor.

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Commissioner Hilderbrand made a motion, with no objections from the press, to amend the Agenda to move Steve Rockers of KDOT from 11:00 AM to 10:45 AM, Commissioner Garner seconded the motion, and all voted in favor.

Commissioner Collins made a motion, with no objections from the press, to amend the Agenda to move Jan Bolin of Class LTD. from 1:15 PM to 11:30 AM, his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner and all voted in favor.

Commissioner Collins made a motion to adopt Resolution # 4-2010 regarding the transferring of funds from Fund 110 to Fund 370 which moves \$225,000.00 from Fund 110 from the 2009 Budget to Fund 370 for use in 2010 to maintain budget flexibility for the 2010 fiscal year and enable the purchase of equipment, his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner, and all voted in favor. Commissioners Collins, Hilderbrand, and Garner signed off, and Clerk Gatewood attested the document.

Commissioner Collins made a motion to adopt Resolution # 5-2010 regarding specifying procedures for the approval of Grant Applications throughout all county offices and Cherokee County, Kansas Sewer Districts #1 and #2; which would create a master list; specifying procedures for the maintenance thereof to be kept in the Cherokee County Clerk's Office, his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner, and all voted in favor. Commissioners Hilderbrand, Garner, and Collins signed off, and Clerk Gatewood attested the document.

Commissioner Hilderbrand made a motion to adopt Resolution # 6-2010 regarding the imposing of a fee for inmates engaged in work release during detention at the Cherokee County Law Enforcement Center, his motion was seconded by Commissioner Collins, and all voted in favor. Commissioners Garner, Hilderbrand, and Collins signed off, and Clerk Gatewood attested the document.

Commissioner Collins made a motion to recess for lunch, his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner, and all voted in favor.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

It is noted Commissioner Collins had a meeting to attend and had to leave at 1:30 PM.

Commissioner Hilderbrand made a motion to go into Executive Session for Attorney/Client Privilege for ten minutes with himself, Commissioner Garner and County Counselor Kevin Cure, his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner, and all voted in favor. They went in at 1:47 PM and returned at 1:59 PM.

Commissioner Hilderbrand made a motion to go into Executive Session for Attorney/Client Privilege for five minutes with himself, Commissioner Garner, Cherokee County Clerk Crystal Gatewood, and County Counselor Kevin Cure, his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner, and all voted in favor. They went in at 2:16 PM and returned at 2:20 PM.

Commissioner Garner made a motion to adjourn, his motion was seconded by Commissioner Hilderbrand and all voted in favor. The next Cherokee County Commission meeting will be held April 26, 2010 at 9:00 AM in the Cherokee County Courthouse in Columbus, Kansas, and will adjourn at 12:00 PM.





Funding Request to Cherokee County Commission for 2011

CLASS LTD's mission is to partner with people with disabilities, their families, and support networks, so they may discover their potential, responsibly exercise their choices, and shape their own future.

Our Vision is to be in the forefront of innovative and progressive services, and advocacy for persons with developmental disabilities. It is also our vision that persons with developmental disabilities are included and considered an integral part of their community.

CLASS LTD is requesting Cherokee County Commission to allocate one-mill for services for children and adults with developmental disabilities living in this county. We are very appreciative of Cherokee County's continued financial support that provides for many needed community disability services.

CLAS LTD's state funding for developmental disabilities services was reduced more than \$500,000 this fiscal year with little hope to have any funds restored next fiscal year. County funding will be most important for CLASS LTD with reduced state funding to be able to continue services to individuals loosing state funding. The services we provide enable our clients to safely and successfully live and work in their communities.

CLASS LTD has provided much needed services for children and adults with developmental disabilities for more than 35 years. The individuals we work with have grown in independence as a result of our services, therefore less dependent on governmental funding. We have prevented unnecessary institutionalization in a number of situations and worked to keep families together. We assist our clients to find and keep jobs and to live successfully in their community. To continue to obtain these positive outcomes requires a partnership with the County Commission as well as with our state funding sources. The need for county funding includes:

- Subsidy for our transportation services
- Funding for persons who have a intellectual disability but do not meet the state's eligibility criteria
 - o Job coaching to find and retain employment
 - o In-home supports to remain living in their homes
 - Crisis management
- Local match for state and federal grants, i.e., accessible housing, Eco-Glass project, transportation
- Infrastructure such as information technology and other equipment and supplies

CLASS LTD's commitment to Cherokee County Commission:

- 1. Maintain full licensure by Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS).
- 2. Maintain the highest level of accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Services (CARF).
- 3. Serve or arrange to serve Cherokee County citizens with developmental disabilities.
- 4. Provide services according to individualized lifestyle choices to the extent possible.
- 5. Obtain an average satisfaction rating from persons receiving services of at least 90%.
- 6. Provide family members (including siblings) of persons with developmental disabilities the related supports they need and request.
- 7. Create job opportunities for persons served by CLASS LTD.
- 8. Expand valued activities to people with developmental disabilities including those who are or becoming elderly that will enhance their quality of life.
- 9. Provide fixed route transportation service within the county.
- 10. To promote health and wellness initiatives for staff and persons we serve.
- 11. Develop and maintain a network of community services for individuals with developmental disabilities by affiliating with, assisting and monitoring all organizations providing such services in Cherokee County.
