MINUTES FOR SEPTEMBER 26, 2011

The Cherokee County Commissioners met September 26, 2011. Commissioners Collins, Garner, and Hilderbrand were present. The Pledge of Allegiance was said by all. Commissioner Collins made a motion to approve the minutes for September 19, 2011 as submitted; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Hilderbrand with Commissioners Garner, Collins, and Hilderbrand voting in favor. Commissioners Collins, Hilderbrand and Garner, and County Clerk Crystal Gatewood signed off on the approved minutes. Commissioner Collins made a motion to approve and pay September 2011 Accounts Payables; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Garner with Commissioners Collins, Garner, and Hilderbrand voting in favor. Commissioners Garner, Hilderbrand and Collins, and County Clerk Gatewood signed off on the documentation. County Counselor Cure was not present. (It is duly noted in the County General Fund that the Emergency Preparedness Department is currently over budget for the year 2011.) Commissioner Collins made a motion to approve and pay September 2011 Payroll; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Hilderbrand with Commissioners Collins, Garner, and Hilderbrand voting in favor. Commissioner Garner signed off on the documentation. Commissioners Garner, Collins and Hilderbrand, and Clerk Gatewood signed off on nine Lease Agreements for vacated flooding areas in the county. Treasurer Juanita Hodgson brought over her monthly budget report update for September 2011; it is attached to these minutes. Hodgson also is estimating that driver's license renewal in the courthouse will be open again by January 2012 after her staff has completed all training.

AGENDA BUSINESS

Commissioner Garner made a motion to amend the agenda and move Mack Young from 11:00 AM to 10:50 AM; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Hilderbrand with Commissioners Collins, Garner, and Hilderbrand voting in favor. Mack Young gave an update on year end goals and objectives for the 11th Judicial District Community Corrections and these are attached to these minutes. The commission thanked him for coming in.

Commissioner Collins made a motion to amend the agenda and move Rob Medley and Mary Kay Caldwell from 11:30 AM to 11:00 AM; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Hilderbrand with Commissioners Collins, Garner, and Hilderbrand voting in favor. The group representing Paw Prints on the Heartland came before the commission to request a donation of \$1000.00 from Cherokee County for the work they provide for neutering and spaying dogs and cats in Southeast Kansas. Ms. Caldwell explained that they provide this service to area citizens for a price of \$35.00 and if the citizen is low income, disabled, or unable to pay it is done free of charge. The information is attached to these minutes. The commission said that they would get back with them at later time after they review the county budget. The commission thanked them for coming in.

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Commissioner Garner has set up a meeting on October 17, 2011 for Raymond Griffith to meet with Kansas Wildlife and Parks representative Rob Riggens to discuss his property issue. Mr. Griffith was present at the meeting and Clerk Gatewood gave him a note to remind him of the upcoming meeting.

The commission received the 2012 County Budget, approved by the commission and completed by Gene Mense from Cherokee County Clerk Gatewood. Commissioner Garner asked if funds could be moved around next year if they see one of the offices does not have enough funds and Commissioner Hilderbrand said only in General Fund. The General Fund line items are: Commissioners, County Clerk, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Sheriff, Jail, Human Resource, Courthouse, District Court, Emergency Preparedness, 911 Mapping, Economic Development, Recreation, Genealogy Society, GIS Information Handling Services, Jury Costs, Employee Compensation, County Counselor, Sheriff Overtime, Computer Programming, Planning Commission, Capital Lease Jail, and the Jail Cop Cash Reserve.

ADJOURNMENT

Commissioner Garner made a motion to adjourn at 11:38 AM for the day; his motion was seconded by Commissioner Hilderbrand with Commissioners Garner, Collins, and Hilderbrand voting in favor. The next Cherokee County Commission meeting will be held October 3, 2011 at 9:00 AM in the Cherokee County Courthouse in Columbus, Kansas.

Pawprints on the Heartland, a low-cost spay/neuter program has been active in Cherokee County since 2000.

During that time, Pawprints has performed thousands of surgeries preventing the births of many, many unwanted animals.

Pawprints has been a service to the citizens of Cherokee County by controlling the overpopulation of animals as well as making Cherokee County a safer place health-wise.

During the period of 2010 and to date 2011, Pawprints has had approximately 15 surgery appointments in Galena, Columbus, and Riverton spaying/neutering approximately 1000 animals.

The cost for each trip is over \$700 which includes paying the vet, two vet techs, and vehicle expense. (15 trips X \$700 = \$10,500) Some of the expense is paid through program fees, but much of it is paid by Pawprints through private fund-raising as many of the citizens cannot pay the \$35 fee.

Therefore, Pawprints would like to request from Cherokee County \$2000 to help defray these costs.

Thank you for your consideration of this matter as we hope to continue Pawprints services to this county.

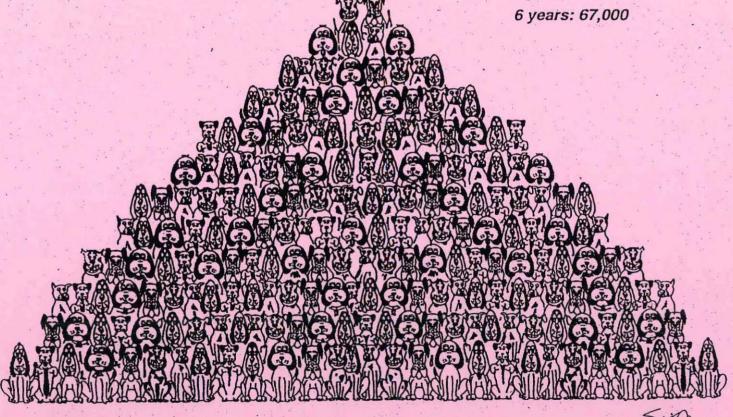

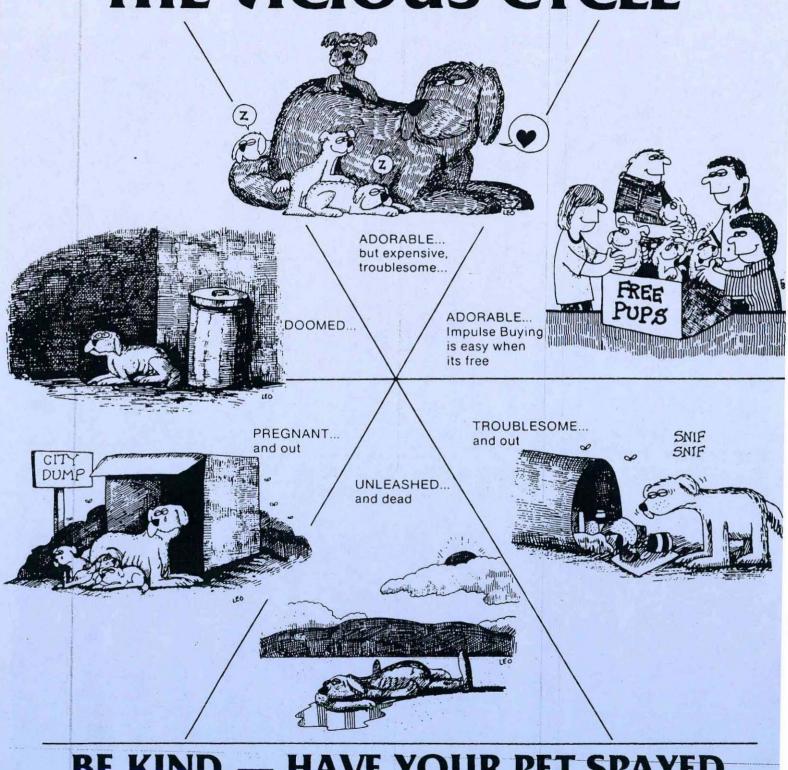

Progress: We were able to re-initiate our Pre-contemplation group, "Getting Motivated to Change" this quarter. Three ISO's have completed the facilitation of Getting Motivated to Change, and a fourth officer is currently teaching group. Only one officer remains, that will need to teach it in FY 2012. All ISO's taught T4C last year and it will be our focus to have them facilitate again in FY 2012.

Objective #3. The Administrative Director will dispense to the local stakeholders an informative guide featuring the theories of Evidence-Based practices, how those principles guide our agency, and the benefits to the community and our stakeholders by November 1, 2010.

Overall Program Objectives

GOAL: To strive for successful completion of every client, by utilizing Evidence-Based practices in our supervision. To be successful in our use of the LSI-R to target areas identified as criminogenic risk factors and establishing supervision plans with each client to identify goals in assisting them with their success

Objective #1 To maintain revocation reduction of at least 20% (from FY 2006 data) thru FY 2010.

Progress: In this quarter, there were a total of 45 cases discharged incorporating 31 clients. Of those 31 individuals, the following discharges are recorded:

- 12 Revoked
- 14- Successful
- 3- Unsuccessful Closed by Court
- 1- Not Sentenced
- 1-Death

Of those 12 revoked, 1 was with a new felony conviction, 1 with a new misdemeanor conviction and 10 as condition violators.

The conditions violators included:

- (3) individuals who would be pending new charges but through a
 plea agreement they agreed to serve the probation sentence in return for
 the new case not being filed.
- (1) Individual requested to serve their sentence.
- (3) Individuals had continued alcohol and drug issues and treatment either was refused or they were unable to abstain.
- (3) condition violators were absconders,
- Overall, 60% of the condition violators had at least 1 or more prior revocation hearings while on supervision with us.

Our success rate for the 4th Quarter was only 61.3% (according to new KDOC formulas)

YR END

In FY 2011, there were a total of 172 cases discharged incorporating 113 clients. Of those 113 individuals, the following discharges were recorded:

- 32 Revoked
- 69- Successful
- · 5- Unsuccessful Closed by Court
- 4- Not Sentenced
- 3-Death

Of those 32 revoked, 11 were with a new felony conviction, 1 with a new misdemeanor conviction and 20 as condition violators.

The conditions violators included:

- (6) Individuals who were pending new charges but through a
 plea agreement they agreed to serve the probation sentence in return for
 the new case not being filed.
- (3) Individual requested to serve their sentence.
- (3) Individuals had continued alcohol and drug issues and treatment either was refused or they were unable to abstain.
- (7) condition violators were absconders,
- (1) case was a misdemeanor case only
- Overall, 50% of the condition violators had at least 1 or more prior revocation hearing while on supervision with us.

Our success rate for FY 2011 was only 71.7% (according to new KDOC formulas) According to our target goal, we missed our goal by 3 individuals.

Objective #2 95% of offenders successfully discharged from this program will be employed, on disability or not required to be employed, at their time of discharge.

Progress: 14 individuals had successful case discharges this period, 2 remain on supervision. Of the remaining 12, 1 individual was on disability at discharge, 1 individual was a compact case and their employment status was unknown at discharge and 6 were employed. Four (4) individuals were not employed, three (3) being discharged by the Court while the fourth case, a misdemeanor, was transferred back to court when the felony case was revoked in another county.

At year end, there were 69 successful discharges, forty six (46) of whom were required to have employment at the end of supervision. Of those 46 individuals, 33 were employed at discharge (72%). Of the remaining 13, twelve were discharged by the Court without employment and 1 was transferred back to Court Services.

Objective #3 75% of all successful completions in fiscal year 2010 will have an education level when leaving our program of or higher than a high school or equivalent education

Progress: Of the 14 individuals who had successful case discharges this period, 1 individual who needs his GED remains on supervision. Of the remaining 13, 9 had at least a GED or higher education. With the remaining four, two were discharged by the Court, one GED was waived by this agency and one case was transferred back to Court services.

At year end, 5 of the 69 discharges remained on supervision. Of the remaining 64, 52 had a GED or high school equivalent education. The remaining individuals were court discharged without the education level (5), were waived by this agency (3) or were transferred back to Court services (2)

Progress: In this 4th Quarter, we had 35 new assignments to our program. Of those assignments, 6 were not required to have LSIR's completed as per standards. (2- Administrative assignments, 1 transfer out, 2 compact cases and 1 case ended up not being officially assigned). Of the remaining 29, 25 were on time (86.2%).

At year end, we had a total of 122 new assignments. Of those assignments, 18 were not required to have LSIR's (13 were compacted or transferred out and 5 were not yet due because of their status). With the remaining 104 individuals, 89 had LSIR assessments completed on time, 85.6% compliance rate.

Progress: In this 4th Quarter, we had 35 new assignments to our program. Of those assignments, 8 Case Supervision Plans (CSP's) were not required to be completed. (1- Transfer Out, 2- Compact, 1- Presentence cases, 2- Administrative Assignments, 1- in jail out of county, 1- case was not assigned). Of the remaining 27, 23 were on time with 5 being late.

At year end, of the 124 newly assigned cases, 94 required CSP and only 69 were on time. This area continues to be a struggle for this agency. Individual officers who struggle have been identified and this area is listed on their performance evaluation with goals related to their improvement of meeting this KDOC standard.

Objective 1: To serve a total of 40 clients in our District who have been determined by their officer to be in the Pre-Contemplation stage.

Thinking for a Change

GOAL: To reduce revocations by at least 20%, by assisting offenders in adapting the way they think and thus react to everyday stressors and situations. By assisting them in changing their cognitive skills, we are in return helping them become successful in their supervision and in daily accomplishments

Objective #1 To serve a minimum of 40 clients per fiscal year.

Progress: No Thinking for a Change groups started this quarter, due to the increase in the class length from 13 weeks to 26 weeks that was initiated in March 2011.

Comments: We have started our Pre-contemplation groups back in two counties which should increase our numbers served for this group. Progress: No T4C groups graduated in this quarter, due to the extended class lengths. At year end, 11 of 21 clients served successfully graduated from thinking for a change. (52.4%)

Discussion / Current Activities: Of the 10 who were dismissed from the program, 9 were due to excessive absences.

Progress: There were two (2) discharges from this program this quarter that had previously completed the T4C program: both were discharged unsuccessfully. One client was revoked with a new felony conviction, and the other was a condition violator. At year end, there were 13 discharges with 8, being successful.

To date there have been a total 37 discharges from supervision who successfully completed the T4C program. 29 of the 37 (78.3%) have been discharged successfully from Community Corrections. 8 (21.7%) have been unsuccessful discharged; six have been DOC admissions, another the felony case was revoked (credit for time served ended the sentence) and the misdemeanor cases were turned over to Court Services, and one individual passed away.

Employment Skills Programs

GOAL: To reduce revocations by at least 20%, by assisting offenders in employment endeavors. To provide each client with the opportunity to locate successful careers and financial consistency by stressing job placement, stability, retention and by providing the skills necessary for any offender to reach their occupational goals.

Objective #1 To lower the agency unemployment rate from the average rate of 26.5% by at least 3% by the end of FY 2011.

Of the remaining five, one was discharged due to a clerical error on the termination date (scores increased), three (3) others scores remained the same (unsuccessful terminations), and one's scores actually increased at his unsuccessful termination.
